<p>Programme of Study</p> <p>What do pupils gain from RE at this key stage? Pupils should develop their knowledge and understanding of religions and worldviews, recognising their local, national and global contexts. They should use basic subject-specific vocabulary. 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<p>Ramadan)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Give examples of how Muslims put their beliefs about prayer into action</li></ul> <p>Make connections:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Think, talk about and ask questions about Muslim beliefs and ways of living</li><li>• Talk about what they think is good for Muslims about prayer, respect, celebration and self-control, giving a good reason for their ideas</li><li>• Give a good reason for their ideas about whether prayer, respect, celebration and self-control have something to say to them too.</li></ul>		
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
